Pesticides—do you have your certificate of competence?

Did you know that if you were born after 31st December 1964 and are using agricultural plant protection products (herbicides, pesticides, fungicides, etc.) it is ESSENTIAL that you have a CER-TIFICATE OF COMPETENCE?

The National Proficiency Tests Council (NPTC) administers the various tests required to obtain the certificates of competency.

There are currently 13 different units PA1 to PA13. PA1 is a general foundation unit. In itself, it is not a certificate of competence for application of plant protection products, but it is a pre-requisite before taking any of the other units. Units PA2 to PA13 cover specific methods of application: you need a certificate of competence for ALL methods of application you use.

Generally, the units are just referred to be their code - e.g. PA2 - which isn't very helpful when you are trying to find out which unit you need. The titles of the units are:

- PAI foundation
- PA2 Ground Crop Sprayer mounted or trailed
- PA3 Broadcast or variable geometry boom sprayer – mounted or trailed
- PA4 pesticide granular application mounted or trailed
- PA5 boated mounted applicators
- PA6 handheld applicators
- PA7 aerial applicator pilot

- PA8 mixer loader
- PA9 fogging, misting and smokes
- PAI0 batch dipping
- PAII seed equipment treatment
 - PAI2 application of pesticides to material as a continuous process via conveyor, roller tables and other moving equipment

• PAI3 – subsurface liquid applicator (nb some units are subdivided further for more specific application methods)

Courses are offered by most local agricultural colleges, plus various independent training companies. The cost of the course is set by the training provider and prices vary. However, we are talking about hundreds of pounds, not tens of pounds.

When enquiring about costs of courses, make sure to check whether the registration and examination fees are included. There may be help towards the cost of the training through Lantra's Farming Connect Skills Programme.

Grants available for countryside skills courses

Lantra and CCW have funding available (subject to eligibility criteria) for smallholders and contractors to improve their skills in countryside management.

The funding covers between 30% and 50% for courses including fencing, dry stone walling, bracken control, tree planting and hedgelaying.

The grants are available until March 2010-so if you are interested, don't delay in finding out more.

The aim of the project is to improve practical skills for the benefit of the environment.

Small scale poultry slaughter &

processing

On the 22nd of October 2009 CALU held a workshop at The Welsh Poultry Centre, Llanpumsiant, Carmarthenshire. Owned and managed by Steve Merritt and Juliet Fay.

Steve and Juliet moved to their farm eight years ago. They set up their slaughter house on the farm so that they could slaughter and process both their own, and other producers' poultry.

Initially their slaughter house was registered under the Meat Hygiene Services (MHS) Licence. This allowed them to slaughter and process other people's poultry as well as their own. Unfortunately due to the costs involved in paying an MSH registered veterinarian to witness any killing or evisceration, it was un-economical. Therefore, the premises now operates under an 'exempt' licence.

Under this licence up to 10,000 birds may be killed each year. They are only allowed to be sold

direct to the final consumer, and only within your local or immediately neighbouring Local Authority area.

Another restriction of the licence is that it only allows slaughter of your own birds, not those belonging to other producers.

As well as providing a detailed insight into the legislative processes and requirements involved in setting up and running a small scale poultry slaughterhouse, the workshop provided an invaluable practical insight into the operation of the facilities.

Attendees walked the full process line from the point where birds are caught, through stunning, bleeding, plucking and evisceration to the final product. With an explanation of the equipment required at each stage of the process and approximate costs.

Feedback from the event was very positive. The notes from the day have been written up and are available on the CALU website.

New CALU factsheets available

Since our last newsletter, we have produced several new factsheets and reports on demonstration farm events.

In the **horticulture section** there is a new introductory factsheet on growing sweet cherries.

In the **woodland section** we have two new factsheets: one providing a basic overview of conventional woodland mensuration (measurement) techniques for volume assessment; the other touches on the evaluation of firewood volumes in stands of trees, how to equate this to potential energy values, and also the perennial issue of assessing a sustainable harvest. Following on from a very successful workshop on small scale slaughter and processing for poultry producers, the notes from the workshop have been published. Similarly the notes from the excellent workshop we held at Welsh Fruit Stocks looking at the commercial propagation of cane and soft fruits are available.

Another new addition which has been keenly awaited by many is our new factsheet providing a basic introduction to the practical and bureaucratic issues any one new to **land ownership** will need to tackle.

Our factsheets are all written in response to requests from the
